

A CELEBRATION OF NATURE'S SYMPHONY

Taking place on the first Sunday of May, International Dawn Chorus Day is the worldwide celebration of nature's greatest symphony. All across the world people rise early to revel in the sweet sound of birdsong, from rattling wrens in Rotherham to crooning cowbirds in the Caribbean. And you don't have to head out to a nature reserve, you can just open your window and listen...

WHO CAN I HEAR? Log on to www.wildlifetrusts.org/dawn-chorus-day to listen to recordings of some of the star performers.

Song thrush... Often the most confident voice and one of the earliest to start singing. Listen for loud, clear verses repeated two to four times.

Blackbird... Another early riser, with a clear and confident voice. The song is low-pitched and given in short, fluty verses. Unlike the song thrush, blackbirds don't repeat their verses.

Robin.. Like the thrushes, robins start singing early in the morning. The song is clear and comprised of rippling notes and whistles. Robins are one of the few birds to sing all through winter.

Blackcap... This migrant warbler has one of the finest voices. Its song begins as a chattering warble, before breaking into louder, clearer flute-like notes. Chiffchaff... One of the most easily recognised voices in the dawn chorus. The chiffchaff's song is a repetitive 'chiff chaff, chiff chaff, chiff chaff', occasionally with an extra note mixed in.

TALES FROM THE CHALKSTREAM

Actually, more of a riddle from the allotments...

So what do St Mark's Day, compost heaps and nectar actually have in common?

Bear with me...

Working on my allotment on 25th April (St Mark's Day) I saw a host of long (10-15mm), thin, hairy black flies lazily clinging onto the inside of my netting which I had hoped was protecting my allotment onions.

Well... as a novice allotmenteer I was worried! Were these critters onion fly chomping through my over-wintered crop, or even carrot fly from last year's crop rotation? Was it something worse?

A photo later and a look on the Insect ID app and all is well.

These are St Mark's flies (*Bibio Marci*, also know as Hawthorn flies). Completely harmless, even if they fly rather sluggishly and land on anything in their way, including us humans. The larvae live in rotting soil and compost which I had of course previously transferred onto my onions. They generally appear within a few days of St Mark's Day (right on time this year!), and are one of our earliest pollinators, especially of fruit trees, as they feed on nectar.

Much relieved, I happily released them to do their good work, and carried on, slightly bemused that I found a fly and its unseen work, quite so absorbing.

The minimum age for entry is 15 years for the 10km and 17 years for the 10 mile, while the Fun Run is open to all runners five years and over. (There is also a toddler race across Hartletts Park.)

SOLVE: SAVE OUR LODDON VALLEY ENVIRONMENT

PROJECTS IN RECENT YEARS SUCH AS THE PUBLICISED SWINDALE BECK PROJECT (CUMBRIA 2016) SHOW HOW QUICKLY WILDLIFE RETURNS WHEN THE NATURAL RIVER HABITATS ARE RE ESTABLISHED

The story from Swindale....

'About 200 years ago, the community of Swindale embarked on an ambitious project to straighten a section of the beck, with the aim of speeding the flow of water through the valley and increasing the amount of farmland surrounding it. Which had unintended consequences. The faster-flowing water was too swift for fish like salmon and trout to spawn. And the river carried more sediment downstream, making it murkier.'

So in 2016, the RSPB and project partners – Environment Agency, Natural England – and the water company who owns the land – embarked on a remeandering 'rewiggling' project.

'After studying the valley to locate the original path carved out by the river, a team of diggers was dispatch to recreate the curvy channel. It is now about 180m (200 yards) longer than the straight line that had been in the valley bottom for two centuries.

'The transformation was almost immediate: "About three months after the diggers left - we had salmon and trout spawning in the river again."

'The re-established, meandering curves have slowed down the flow of water, which creates aquatic habitat at each bend. Fish, including minnows (pictured), salmon and trout now have vegetation for cover.

"We now have vegetation in the river, where young fish can shelter... There are gravel banks, deep pools and riffles – shallow, turbulent parts of the river where the water draws in oxygen. It all benefits the whole food chain.

"It's like a living thing moving through the valley now, while the old, straightened river was just like a sad canal."

'This restoration was expensive. Funded in equal parts by the RSPB, the Environment Agency, Natural England and the water company landowner, United Utilities, it cost just over £200,000 to 'rewiggle' the 1km (0.6 miles) stretch of beck.'

The Government is currently funding a number of conservation schemes like this one under what is called the Landscape Recovery Scheme. Through this, farmers will be able to apply for money to boost biodiversity on their land, possibly by 're-wiggling' their own rivers or establishing more wild spaces like woodlands. Somewhat ironically, environmental damage that water companies cause in the future could also provide a funding source for restoration projects such as this.

REPORTS FROM HAMPSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

CREATE A LOCAL NATURE RESERVE

On 20 March 2023 DEFRA and Natural England updated the guidance on declaring a Local Nature Reserve (LNR). It is now easier for Parish and Town Councils to make a declaration... this is an opportunity to contribute to Nature Recovery while engaging members of the community of all ages.

To declare your site as an LNR first contact Natural England consultations@naturalengland.org.uk or 0300 060 3900.

You'll be asked to formally declare your LNR by sending a draft declaration document (template on the website). It must include a boundary map and a management plan detailing:

- ownership of the land
- any agreements or partnerships
- why the LNR site was chosen
- aims and objectives
- biodiversity management & environmental education
- community participation, access & visitor management
- costs and funding arrangements.

Following consultation you will be asked to send the final declaration document to Natural England. To read the guidance in full see:

VOTER ID

To vote at a polling station on Thursday 04 May 2023 you will need to bring photo ID. Polling station staff will all attend compressive training sessions on Voter ID and its application at the polling station.

You only needone form of photo ID. It needs to be the original, not a photocopy. Expired ID is acceptable, provided the photograph remains a good likeness.

Accepted forms of photo ID include:

- Passport issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state or a Commonwealth country
- Driving licence issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, or an EEA state (this includes a provisional driving licence)
- A Ministry of Defence Form 90 (Defence Identity Card.)
- A relevant concessionary travel pass funded by the UK government.
- Older Person's / Disabled Person's Bus Pass
- Oyster 60+ Card (more rigorous application than 18+ Oyster Card)
- Freedom Pass
- A badge prescribed under the "blue badge scheme."
- Voter Authority Certificate
- Student cards that are PASS accredited would be accepted (eg the National Union of Students 'TOTUM' student card). All accredited PASS cards bear the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram.

From the Ministry Team

As I'm writing this, it certainly feels like Spring has sprung. Birds are chirping outside, sunshine is pouring through my window and there

is a warmth that was not there a week or two ago.

It really is great, and it gives life a more positive and optimistic feel. I'm noticing many more smiling people and a generally increased joy about the place. In the light, in the warmth, there is hope. There is optimism.

There is a noticeable increase in green around us, and the multi-coloured blanket of flowers is slowly beginning to emerge. The cold, stark winter landscape is transforming and I'm aware – as you read this in the May edition – we will be even further through this progression.

This leads me to think about light... In some ways, in the winter when things are so dark, we're much more acutely aware of the light. When it shines into the darkness, we notice it and immediately sense its impact. However, when we have more

daylight and the sun consistently shines, we begin to take it for granted. We begin to just accept that it will be there shining each day (despite this being far from a certainty in England!). And this has made me wonder about how much in life we take for granted, how many good and lovely things we don't always appreciate.

With a cost of living crisis, and the war in Ukraine as the two most obvious examples, I think we are seeing in many ways the undermining of those things we take for granted. In these cases, readily accessible food and heating, and the expectation of security and stability. It can feel deeply unnerving and unsettling, and if we're not careful we can obsess over these things.

It's at these times when I feel the need to remind myself, and others, of the one thing in life more constant, consistent and stable than the rising of the springtime sun. Jesus is above all things, over all things, in all things. While we may not always feel him there, or appreciate his presence, or maybe even acknowledge his existence, he is always there.

'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever.' Hebrews 13.8 Writing this as we are about to walk through Holy Week, remembering again the journey Jesus took to the cross, the grave and into resurrection after, for us, fills me with confidence. The one who entered in to be like us, to die and rise again to ensure that death is not the end, to give us a hope for the future. The one who did all that for us is constant, even in the uncertainty of the world around us. He is sure and constant. I pray you know his blessing this springtime, as the flowers bloom and the leaves return, and into the rest of the year ahead.
