**Ken Miles** It is sad to report that long term Mapledurwell resident, Ken Miles, died on the 17th April after dealing with cancer for the last two years. He was so positive about life and always ready for a chat right up to the end. He was grateful for the extra time he had after the diagnosis. Although Ken was a local man - born in Tadley but raised in Up Nately and Mapledurwell - he had a well travelled career: 15 years in the Royal Navy and, after working for the Post Office and Lansing Bagnell, he spent the last 16 years of his working life with De la Roue in Basingstoke as a security officer which involved more extensive travelling.

Both Ken and his daughter Kay were members of the St John Ambulance Brigade for about 10 years and attended many events together.

Ken was happily married to Pat for 57 years before she died in 2015 and leaves daughter Kay and granddaughter Amanda and her husband Gary.

He felt very lucky that the last years of his life were shared with Avril, whom he had known since he was 13, and lived just down the road from her in Mapledurwell for many years. They became partners in 2018 and joyfully married last October.

Ken dealt with life's problems, especially his health issues, with such good grace that it is a lesson to us all. It was a pleasure to have known him.

**Murray Bywater** Murray Bywater sadly died on the 4th April, after falling while on the Isle of Wight by his holiday home.

Murray and Pamela lived at Webbs Barn in Mapledurwell for nearly 30 years before moving to Odiham in 2014. They were both great supporters of the church and village life and were much missed when they left. Our condolences go to Pamela and the family.

# IN COMMEMORATION OF THE 80TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE D-DAY LANDINGS

The 6th June 2024 marks the 80th anniversary of D-Day, when Allied forces mounted the largest amphibious invasion the world has witnessed.

In 1944 Operation Overlord saw 4,000 ships and landing craft set down 132,500 troops on five Normandy beaches in an action that would bring about the liberation of northwest Europe from Nazi occupation.

The bravery and sacrifice of those people in securing the peace and freedom we enjoy today will be observed by the lighting of beacons around the UK, Channel Islands, Isle of Man and UK Overseas Territories.

I hope your community will join us. We are asking communities and organisations of all sizes to mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day by lighting a beacon at 9.15pm on 06 June in celebration of the 'light of peace' that emerged from the darkness of war, and with an event to commemorate one of the most momentous achievements in living memory.

Your event could be devoted to raising valuable funds for The Royal Naval Association, ABF The Soldiers' Charity, The Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund, The Merchant Navy Association.

It is our country's opportunity to remember over 209,000 Allied casualties of Operation Overlord.

This includes nearly 37,000 ground forces and 16,714 air forces killed in the invasion of Normandy's Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno and Sword beaches, and the long and bloody campaign that followed.

We plan to light beacons on all five beaches to remember those who died or came home wounded. The statistics behind the operation which eventually convinced the Nazi high command that their defeat was inevitable, are both shocking and awe inspiring.

German defence forces were drawn away from Normandy by distraction tactics as resources were secretly built up on the English coast. Nine million tonnes of supplies and equipment were shipped across the Atlantic and 1.4 million American servicemen arrived to join a substantial contingent of Canadian forces. By 1944 over two million troops from 12 countries were in Britain preparing for the invasion.

On D-Day, American, British and Canadian troops were augmented by personnel from Australia, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, the Netherlands, France, Greece, New Zealand, Norway, Rhodesia and Poland. Soon after midnight on 6th June, more than 180,000 Allied paratroopers were dropped into the invasion area, and Allied air crews flew 14,674 sorties to support the landings.

### MORE PEOPLE ELIGIBLE FOR FREE ENERGY-SAVING HOME IMPROVEMENTS

Residents now with a household income of up to £36,000 – living in inefficient homes without gas boilers – can apply for free energy-saving measures from the Warmer Homes Consortium, of which BDBC is part.

The funding is from the Home Upgrade Grant, a government scheme that aims to help people that own or rent a home without gas central heating to make their property more energy efficient. Improvements that can be fully funded by the grant include insulation, heat pumps, solar panels and heating controls.



### OLDSKOOL NEVERLAND FESTIVAL – TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT PLAN

Information from HCC Local Highways Authority 08/04/2024:

'I can confirm that the Traffic Management Plan was discussed at the recent Safety Advisory Group (SAG) meeting. The County Council as the highway authority gave advice to the organisers on their proposed methods of controlling traffic for the event while managing the needs of the residents. In summary the proposals are:

- 1. Advance warning signs are to be erected on all approaches to the village two weeks prior to the event informing highway users and asking them to seek alternative routes.
- 2. A one-way system is proposed to operate along Ashmoor Lane and Poors Farm Road between the A30 London Road and Newnham Lane. It will operate over the Bank Holiday weekend to bring customers arriving by car to the parking and camping areas.
- 3. Traffic traveling along the A30 London Road either side of the Ashmoor Lane junction will be controlled by temporary traffic signals with lane one (east bound) and lane two (west bound) forming a queuing lane for event traffic to access Ashmoor Lane. These temporary signals are to be manually controlled to ensure minimum disruption within the wider highway environment. Once all customers have arrived the traffic signals will be deactivated and the A30 returned to a dual carriageway. The traffic signals will return at the end of the event to aid egress from the site. The A30 will also be reduced to 30mph between Hatch and a point west of Andwell Lane.
- 4. The event organisers have stated that once all allotted vehicles are in the car park those vehicles will not be allowed to leave the site until the end of the event unless there are exceptional circumstances.
- A minibus is being proposed to operate from Basingstoke and Hook railway stations delivering customers to the layby on the A30 east of the Martins car dealership. Pedestrians will then follow an overland route to the event site.
- 6. It is proposed that Newnham Lane, Water End Lane, Crown Lane (Newnham), The Street and Bartons Lane, will be closed to through traffic with access for residents only. There are to be traffic Marshalls stationed at each of these points to stop event traffic from rat running.
- 7. 'No Waiting' restrictions are to be proposed by the organiser at natural 'pinch points' within the highway to ensure that Emergency Response personnel and vehicles can access the site without restriction should the need arise.
- A haulage route plan has been requested by Hampshire County Council Highways so that it may understand how event apparatus (Stage) and welfare facilities, catering facilities are to access the site for both the build and breakdown phases.
- 9. A condition survey is to take place between the event organiser and Hampshire County Council Highways prior to the event to obtain a benchmark on the condition of the highway network. The event organiser has given an undertaking to 'make good' any extraordinary deterioration of highway as a consequence of event traffic.
- 10.All Traffic Regulation Orders (road closures, one-way systems, temporary speed limit reductions) will be applied for in July 2024.

At this time, the County Council as the highway authority believes that the organisers have demonstrated that they have carefully thought about how their event traffic will be managed whilst balancing the need of the local residents. There will be further refining of the traffic management plan in the coming weeks with another SAG taking place prior to the event.

# BDBC COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

### This scheme will open again for applications in early Summer 2024

The council recognises the value of community activity and the need to have sustainable infrastructure to deliver this.

Through the Community Infrastructure Fund (CIF), community and voluntary sector organisations can apply for grants to make physical improvements to their premises to improve the user and resident experience, increase income generation and reduce costs and make environmental improvements.

This scheme is not designed to fund large new build projects but can provide funding of up to £50K to:

- enable existing facilities to be enhanced, improved, modernised or retrofitted
- support projects that can complete within a maximum of 12 months from funding being agreed

Organisations wishing to apply for this fund will first need to submit a project proposal form giving an outline of the project and explaining who will benefit, what support there is for the project and the approximate project cost. We will also ask about any permissions or surveys that will be needed for your project and whether these have already been received or applied for.

All proposals will be assessed against the scheme criteria and eligible projects invited to submit a full application. Please note that confirmation to move to the full application stage does not guarantee that you will receive funding. It is a competitive process with limited funds available and not all eligible proposals received can be funded.

### Timeline for new applications

The expected timescales for the 2024/25 application process are given below. These are subject to change:

- Open for proposals: June 2024
- Deadline for proposals: July 2024 (six weeks from fund launch)
- Eligible applications invited to make full application: August 2024
- Deadline for applications: mid to late September 2024 (six weeks from invitation to apply)
- Decision date: mid to late Oct 2024.

### From the **Benefice Ministry Team**

Firstly, to introduce myself. My name is Revd Debbie Veel. I was ordained in July 2023 when I joined

NHDB. I have pastoral responsibility for St Nicholas' Newnham, but I am loving having the opportunity to get to know more of you around the benefice.

I am married to Chris, and we have three adult children and three small granddaughters and up until a couple of years ago we had two elderly cats. We like going to the theatre, cinema and eating out. Chris is sporty, me barely at all! Although I do enjoy dragonboating (think giant 20-seater canoe). We don't watch a huge amount of TV, we do watch documentaries - mainly history and nature and science – but we do enjoy pottery throw down, bake-off; sewing bee, design masters

We are big Apprentice fans too, but my husband frequently says he wouldn't employ any of them! Although this year's batch seems better than previous years!

and glow (the make-up one - Chris

doesn't watch these last two).

Jesus had apprentices too, only we don't call them that. We usually call them disciples. Just as the TV candidates often make spectacular errors so did Jesus' apprentices. The number of times they get it wrong! Peter wants to prevent Jesus from going to Jerusalem because he doesn't understand why Jesus wants to go there if he knows he is going to die and none of them really understand why Jesus chose a donkey not a war horse to ride into Jerusalem.

More apprentice errors - Peter again, initially doesn't want Jesus to wash his feet at the Last Supper. When Jesus

explains that he has come to be a servant not a master then Peter wants to be completely washed all over. Peter also denies he knows Jesus three times in quick succession.

All the disciples, except John, have deserted Jesus at the cross, possibly through fear - only the women remain. The two disciples wearily walking down the road to Emmaus don't even recognise the resurrected Jesus and Thomas after the resurrection doesn't believe the others have seen Him and says he wants to stick his fingers into Jesus' wounds. You see as apprentices they're not

Alan Sugar's 'You're fired!' has become guite a catchphrase. But unlike The Apprentice we don't get fired as Jesus' apprentices. Jesus doesn't send Peter, or Thomas or Cleopas (one of the disciples on the Emmaus Road) home. He doesn't say: 'You're fired!'

doing a great job.

Jesus keeps on giving them and us the opportunity to improve; to be better people again and again and again. It is called forgiveness and is one of the key ideas in the Christian faith. Not easy at all, especially if we have been hurt or betrayed.

I wonder how we can all become Apprentices in learning how to bring in a kingdom of love, gentleness and peace, not war and aggression. Jesus tells us the answer in two simple sentences: 'Love God with all your heart, soul and mind. Love your neighbour as yourself.' That means everyone, including people we do not like or find difficult to be with.

This is THE most difficult apprentice task ever. But take heart because there is room in God's house for all of us and we absolutely WON'T be fired.

If you read last month's Kidzone, you will remember that I promised I would be spending the next few months talking about something called 'The Fruit of the Spirit'.

On the 19th of May, we will celebrate Pentecost in church – basically when God sent us a special helper called The Holy Spirit (who is actually a part of God) to live inside our hearts to help us be more like Jesus (by this time, Jesus had already died, risen again and gone up to heaven).

So the Holy Spirit makes us more like Jesus in nine ways – and this month, I want to introduce you to faithfulness!

But what is faithfulness? Imagine you are waiting for a bus.

You have faith that the bus will arrive and will get you where you

need to be, even though you can't see it yet. (Well, maybe not on the Odiham/Alton road just at the moment!) So you are faithful in the bus. You have faithfulness. So faithfulness means having confidence in something.

The Bible says that God doesn't lie. If he says that Jesus died and rose again so that we can have a brand new start every day, then he did. If God promises that there is nothing that can separate us from his love, then there isn't. If God tells us he will be with us every step of the way, whatever we are going through, he will be. The Bible tells us that God is faithful.

But how can we be sure and how can we be faithful to God? We can't see him, can we? But just like the wind, we can see his effects of his love in our lives, even though we can't see him personally. Next time it is windy outside, go and discover what you can sense because of the wind. See the branches moving. Hear the wind whistling through the trees. Feel the wind in your hair. I wonder how you can sense God's love in your lives? What can you be thankful for?

So if we can recognise him being faithful to us, how can we be faithful to him? Being faithful to God means believing in him and trusting him, even when our feelings don't want to, even when things are going wrong...

People often say to me, 'I don't believe in God' to which I answer, 'Well that's ok, he believes in you!' God is faithful and will never let us down. Never. How about you? God Bless and see you next time! Helen C

#### **Know Your Blood Pressure**

High blood pressure usually has no symptoms, but left untreated it can significantly increase your risk of heart attacks, strokes, kidney disease and vascular dementia.

The only way to know if you

have high blood pressure is to have a blood pressure test. It's a simple and non-invasive procedure conducted at a pharmacy or GP surgery.

If you're aged over 40 you can get a free blood pressure check at a local pharmacy (unless you've already been diagnosed with high blood pressure or a doctor, nurse or pharmacist has already checked your blood pressure in the last six months).

Visit the NHS website at www.nhs.uk/bloodpressure to find out which local pharmacies offer tests.

Or you can use one of the blood pressure machines located in the waiting rooms in the Hook or Hartley Wintney surgeries.

If your blood pressure is high, there are things you can do to treat it with lifestyle changes and/or medication.

Getting your blood pressure checked could save your life.
