Remote Parish Council meetings – Update from NALC (National Association of Local Councils) – who are pushing for remote attendance at Parish Council meetings to be lawful – say they are unhappy that Government’s legislative programme in King’s Speech failed to include measures to enable remote and hybrid council meetings permanently. Noted that Mapledurwell & Up Nately Parish Councillors in favour of in-person meetings as the norm.

Parish Assembly report next month.

NOTES FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MAY AGM

Present Parish Councillors and Clerk. Hugo Cubit was re-elected as Chairman for 2026/27.

Accounts and Audit (AGAR – Accounts and governance accountability return) forms agreed and signed, to be posted to the website; internal audit date arranged for June. The Parish Council is exempt from external audit for 2025/26 as turnover under £25K.

Rights of Rivers Mapledurwell & Up Nately Parish adopted its own ‘Rights of Rivers’ declaration in line with and in support of that agreed and adopted by BDBC and initiated by Ward Cllr Kate Tuck. Agreed strong support in principle, the importance of the Parish location at the headwaters of the Lyde, noting in particular the need for ongoing care and protection of the Frog Lane chalk stream.

Elaine Still was first elected to County in 2005, representing the Loddon division,

thus she served five terms of four year and, though intending then to stand down, an extra year in 2025/26 as County elections were postponed. She was also a BDBC Ward Councilor for Chineham 2002-2023.

Cllr Still was Chairman of the County Council for 2018/19, at the time saying she would dedicate her year to promoting Hampshire's countryside: 'I would like to focus on looking after nature, so nature can look after us... Access to green space, rural and coastal environments has close links to physical health and mental wellbeing; and Hampshire enjoys some of the most beautiful outdoor spaces in the country.'

Since the Parish Council took out a lease on the Frog Lane chalk stream, Elaine consistently supported the planting schemes from her devolved budget and also contributed to the allotments, funding fruit trees, new water butts, and also the Lime tree in the Village Hall grounds. Most recently she provided a grant for a new mapboard adjacent to the Mapledurwell pond.

For Newnham, among many other things, Elaine has supported environmental projects and pond restoration on the Green. Both Parish Councils extend thanks & best wishes.

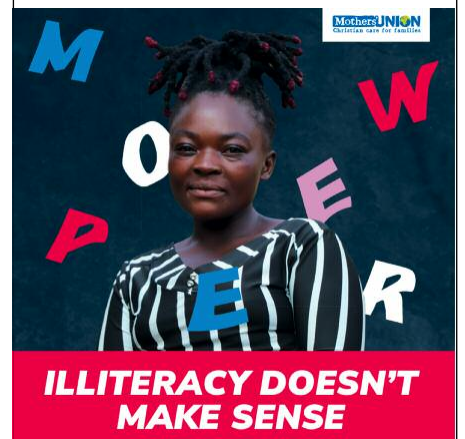

Hi everyone!

A few days ago, a friend of mine shared a quote with me, which has been going around my head ever since:

'Be who God meant you to be, and you will set the world on fire.'

It was written by a brave young saint named Saint Catherine of Siena, who lived hundreds of years ago – but even so, her wisdom can teach us now...

See, she did not mean a real fire with flames and smoke. She meant that when we become the person God meant us to be, our lives can shine brightly and spread goodness, love, and hope to the world around us.

And that includes you!

God Made You Special

Have you ever compared yourself to someone else? Maybe another person seems smarter, faster, funnier, or more talented. It is easy to wonder if you are good enough.

But God did not make you to be exactly like someone else. He created you to be you.

Everyone has different gifts. Some people are good at sports. Others are creative, caring, brave, or helpful. Maybe you are the person who notices when someone feels left out. Maybe you make others laugh when they are sad. Maybe you are gentle, patient, or honest.

The Cuckoo is back – but not for long

The call of the cuckoo 'cuck-oo, cuck-oo' is one of the most evocative sounds of spring, carrying over open countryside, reedbeds and edges of woodland. Males are the first to return and they waste no time announcing their presence loudly as they establish territories and attract females.

The cuckoo (*Cuculus canorus*) has a grey head, barred underparts and bright yellow eye-ring. Sleek and falcon-like, it has pointed wings that droop slightly when perched and a long, graduated tail. It gives an uncanny resemblance to a sparrowhawk in flight and the two are often confused - look at the tail to help distinguish between them.

The cuckoo has an extraordinary breeding behaviour. Rather than building a nest, cuckoos are brood parasites, laying their eggs in the nests of other birds such as reed warblers, meadow pipits and dunnocks.

The female waits patiently for her moment, often when the host is away, before swiftly laying a single egg. Remarkably, these eggs often closely resemble those of their host species.

Once hatched, the young cuckoo wastes no time. Using a remarkable instinct, it pushes any other eggs or chicks out of the nest, ensuring it receives all the food brought by its unsuspecting foster parents. Its loud begging call mimics a whole brood of chicks, prompting the adults to work tirelessly, even as the young cuckoo grows far larger than them.

Cuckoos are also valuable insect hunters, feeding largely on invertebrates, with hairy caterpillars a particular favourite - prey avoided by many other birds.

Cuckoos are long-distance travellers,

The National Garden Scheme is joining forces with the UK Centre for Ecology and Hydrology (UKCEH) to carry out The Big British Garden Survey. This is a complete coincidence, given the recent screening of the excellent BBC1 programme with David Attenborough, *Secret Garden*.

With the severe decline in our wildlife and ecosystems, our gardens have become a vital place for our native flora and fauna. The survey runs until 30th September. Anyone over the age 18 can enter, if you have a garden (big or small), an allotment, a balcony or courtyard garden.

spending the winter in sub-Saharan Africa before returning to the UK in spring. Their stay is shortlived: many adult cuckoos begin their return journey south as early as late June, with young birds following weeks later on an instinctive migration to Africa.

Sadly, the cuckoo's call is no longer as widespread as it once was. Declines in UK populations are linked to habitat loss, pressures on their host species and challenges along migration routes.

Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust works to drive nature's recovery by restoring and protecting vital habitats, from reedbeds and wetlands to woodlands and grazing marshes, supporting cuckoos and the species they depend on. By restoring these habitats at scale and creating richer, more connected landscapes, the Trust is helping ensure that this much-loved sound of spring continues to echo across our countryside for years to come.
