On most occasions a walk down a lane to access a favourite footpath passes without incident, and with common courtesy we all go on our way with a wave, a smile or a thumbs up.

Unfortunately though there are times when this isn't the case and the outcome isn't for the faint hearted. Being hit by a vehicle wing mirror or having a vehicle pass at speed at a ruler's length isn't something that most drivers would feel comfortable with - even if they were in their car let alone walking! Some drivers think that 20mph should be ok, and their efforts are acknowledged, but with some of our roads being very narrow, this leaves very little clearance between pedestrian and car wing mirror. It feels much less safe than you might think. If it isn't possible to make space, please stop and let the pedestrian pass. continued page 3



LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION (LGR) UNITARY COUNCIL PROPOSALS

BDBC is clear on its prefered option for four mainland unitaries, with a 'Northern Hampshire' Unitary comprising BDBC, Hart DC & Rushmoor BC.

Timescales

- 26th September 2025 (requested extension to 28th November 2025) for full proposal to Government on Hampshire's Unitary organisation.
- May 2027 Shadow elections for new Unitary Councils.
- May 2028 New Unitary Councils take over.

THE THIN BLACK LINE

It only takes moments and won't impact your onward journey.

A common assumption is that motorists pay for the roads and, therefore, have more rights. This is wrong. The roads are funded from general taxation and as pedestrians, cyclists, riders and drivers pay some form of tax then all groups are funding the roads.

Then there is the matter of the National Speed Limit (NSL). The key here is the word 'limit' and as such it isn't a target or an entitlement that trumps the way other people use the road. Country lanes are often given an NSL, not because it is believed they can be driven that fast, but because it negates the requirement for repeater signs in many circumstances. There is a legal expectation that you drive to the conditions rather than the limit. So even if you are driving below the limit and hit another road user, you could still be charged with dangerous or careless driving.

There is a temptation within neighbourhoods to see the safety issues with rural roads as being something that has no origin within the community. Studies consistently show that you are most likely to have an accident within the area you are most familiar with. It is called the 'close to home effect' where familiarity with roads lulls road users into being less ready for the unexpected. It is also well documented that there is a far greater propensity to drink-drive in rural areas with access to public transport being limited and the greater likelihood of 'getting away with it'.

If asked, delivery drivers are most quoted as being the worst offenders of all road users, along with taxi drivers. There are no doubt rogues, but drivers of recognisable companies are monitored using in-cab technology, so it is also likely that a fair number are road safety compliant, as failure to be so, ultimately results in dismissal even without Police involvement.

Whilst pedestrians don't necessarily have any legal obligations when it comes to using the roads, they can also help themselves by making sure they can hear their surroundings and can be seen.



THE IMPACT OF THE ENGLISH CIVIL WAR ON NEWNHAM AND THE **SURROUNDING AREA**

The Sieges of Basing House (1643-45) were amongst some of the most significant military actions of the English Civil War. The events affected the whole of North Hampshire with villages being taxed by both sides, raided for provisions and horses, billeting soldiers and in Newnham's case, becoming a parliamentarian outpost to keep watch on royalist Basing House.

Alan Turton is a military historian who specialises in the English Civil War and was curator at the civil war site of Basing House for twenty-four years.

MOTO APPLICATIONS FOR A MOTORWAY SERVICE AREA M3,J6

Moto has submitted a new planning application for the proposed MSA at J6. This application is 'Outline' only and a somewhat scaled-back version (for now) seeking to nullify key objections. The case officer had been minded to refuse the current application due to concerns from National Highways and the Environment Agency. The two applications are now concurrent.



JOIN US ON ASCENSION DAY more!

North Hampshire Downs Churches

Have you marked your calendar for Ascension Day on Thursday May 29th? Please do join us for our beautiful Ascension Day service at 7.30pm that day, in All Saints' Church, Odiham. As we look ahead to this important date in the Christian calendar, people often remark that they've not even heard of Ascension Day.

But for hundreds of years, Christians have affirmed Jesus' ascension in the words of the Apostles Creed, as part of which we say:

'...I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead....'

The picture above is of one of the earliest remaining sculpted-panels in ivory, dating right back to AD400. It depicts Jesus' ascension, and underlines how important this event has been to Christians right through the centuries.

Cyclists do have a legal requirement to have lights but would be well advised to follow in a similar vein in choice of attire.

Sadly, according to RoSPA's 2024 Rural Road Safety Factsheet, in 2023 44 pedestrians were killed on rural roads and 309 seriously injured. In small communities it hits even harder if a local person is either the perpetrator or victim of an incident. I would urge all of us to look out for each other however we use the roads. The roads are for all, and noone leaves home expecting to return either with life changing injuries or not at all.

So please slow down, think and give space to your fellow humankind. Let's travel the thin black line safely.
