Malcolm J W Douglas 18 July 1948 - 28 December 2024

As many *Villager* readers will know, Malcolm Douglas died just before the New Year at the age of 76. The Service of Thanksgiving for his life was held in All Saints' Odiham. The large number of his friends attending showed how much loved and appreciated he was by our whole community.

It was especially poignant when his two sons Rob and Jamie and his daughter Rosie came to pay their tributes. They captured the particular awareness that we were listening to the life of a man who had absolute faith in God, who had no fear of death, and who throughout his life had not only been a brilliant father but had unobtrusively encouraged and prayed for those he felt might benefit from his support.

Malcolm and Camilla met when he was at Oxford and they were married in 1973. Perhaps his heart was not really into the realms of corporate business and finance to which he initially applied himself. It was in the later stages of his career that he and Camilla created the opportunity of working together on their own dynamic enterprises such as Positive Parenting and Grobrain. Their Christian tenets were, and for Camilla still are, key to those of us in our many walks of life who have been touched by their ability to inspire these beliefs.

NOTES FROM THE MARCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Present – Parish Councillors, Clerk and Footpaths Warden.

Tennis court resurfacing

Cleaning (pressure washing) and moss/weed treatment 27 January; patching/repair work 14 March. Painting for April, weather dependent.

Village hall grounds – Some good work completed with thanks to recent visits from Community Payback teams:

An excellent job clearing detritus from kerb-side around the Greywell Road entrance, along the old road and around the Village Hall – the accumulated soil and leaf litter has been temporarily piled in heaps, one trailer-load so far removed;

Cutting back smaller branches overhanging the old road;

Clearing leaves from playground; Cleaning playground equipment, car park barrier and blue gate as far as possible; brushing down the pavilion; Inroads made into clearing the accumulated soil and vegetation from the old car park.

Future visits to complete the car park clearing and spread new gravel.

Trees in new car park – Lower branches overgrowing parking spaces have been cut back. Fencing and post repairs still pending.

Highways and drainage

they're on the system.

Tunworth Road (South). Highways sent out contractors to clear the roadside grips above Greys Farm scheduled for 14 and 15 February. Good news that the contractors came out and did two days' work. These grips will be logged on the HCC system and allocated a clearing schedule (probably once every three years if we're lucky). But at least

The not-so-good is that Highways don't have funding to allocate more budget and time. Contractor spec for grips is apparently a standard 'clear a metre channel to the ditch'. There's no provision for anything different – eg as here where there are roadside banks without continuous ditches. Holding areas (grip dishes) were historically dug into the verge and bank to take and soak away water from the highway – sometimes for several metres length and depth. And are Highways' responsibility.

So with two days' work the task is only begun. Parish Lengthman will continue as much they can but again hours are limited.

With heavy rain overnight 21 February, the road was again flooded at the corner by the holding pond



NOTES FROM THE MARCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING continued

Highways and drainage cont

Frog Lane by allotments - The under-road culverts have been rodded a few times to keep water flowing as best as we can via the ditches and through the chalk stream. (Another recent incident of water running down the middle of Frog Lane!)

Frog Lane potholes reported to HCC. **Blocked gully** at the Frog Lane / Greywell Road junction has been fixed by HCC and water no longer runs across the junction.

The Highways email address

roads@hants is to be discontinued as from 14 April, further distancing Parishes from Highways officers. Requested this be reconsidered.

Chalkstream water level has been very high and has flooded the central island taking away a lot of the brushwood edging. Next job will be to make up some more wood bundles (faggots) from tree cuttings. It's good though to see a strong water flow and some areas are silting up nicely away from the main flows.

Noting that plastic waste and cans are regularly cleared from the river.


Allotments Tree works 24 Feb to remove branches from and make safe the fallen tree; also clearing pathways. Tasks pending: allotment gate (south) awaiting new post; more scalpings for car park and opposite entrance; allotment shed needs new decking and facia timbers (summer job).

everyone on the existing Roll has to also re-apply.

- 1. It shows the 'powers that be' (Diocese of Winchester) that people care about their little local church
- 2 It engenders community and being part of a community is well evidenced to be beneficial for mental health
- 3. Being on the Electoral Roll gives you the right to speak, comment or ask questions should you want to at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) which this year is on Wednesday 30th April 6pm in Greywell Village Hall.

Criteria: You need to be -1. Over 16; 2. have been Baptised; 3. live in the parish or be a regular churchgoer. (You don't have to come to church to be on the electoral roll – but from my point of view that would be amazing if you all chose to!)


DEVOLUTION FOR HAMPSHIRE AND THE SOLENT

The new regional authority – Combined County Authority of Hampshire and the Solent – with a Mayor to be elected in May 2026

Public consultation to Sunday 13 April www.gov.uk/government/consultations/hampshire-and-the-solent-devolution/hampshire-and-the-solent-devolution-consultation

The Mayor and constituent members will have governance of this region which has a population of over two million.

The new Authority will have a seat on the Council of Regions and Nations; will have access to long term strategic funding; will have strategic responsibility for – transport and local infrastructure; housing and strategic planning; economic development and regeneration; environment and climate change; skills and employment support; health and public service reform; public safety, eg Police & Crime Commissioner functions, fire and rescue authority functions.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION (LGR)

THE CURRENT TWO-TIER SYSTEM WITHIN HANTS COUNTY COUNCIL AREA



County Council responsibilities include (not exclusively) education, social services, libraries, trading standards, public transport, highways, waste disposal and recycling – for the whole County area



District and Borough Councils' responsibilities within their own authority areas include planning and building control, housing, street cleaning, waste and recycling collection, licensing, leisure facilities, etc

THE CURRENT UNITARY COUNCILS

Southampton City Council, Portsmouth City Council and the Isle of Wight Council are each separate Unitary authorities within their own right, outside the area of HCC.



The Unitary Authorities are responsible for delivering all services within their area

PROPOSALS FOR LOCAL GOVERMENT REORGANISTION

Government requires that all existing Councils within Hampshire and the Solent be reorganised into Unitary Councils; the existing two-tier system will be abolished and existing smaller unitaries (in most cases) will be expected to join with other councils. Government preference is for unitaries of c50K population.

Not all 15 Councils in Hants & Solent are as yet in agreement re unitary arrangements and so, for Government's deadline for initial proposals of 21 March, they have submitted a joint 'interim plan' to this effect, with 'guiding principles' including on financial viability. Except everyone is in agreement that the Isle of Wight should remain an independent single Unitary.

It seems likely there will be three or four mainland Unitaries and that BDBC will be with Hart with Rushmoor in a 'Northern Hampshire' Unitary. Whether a fourth council will join?

Timescales

- 26 Sept 2025 (request for extension to 28 Nov 2025) for full proposal to Government on Hants unitary organisation.
- May 2027 Shadow elections for new Unitary Councils.
- May 2028 New Unitary Councils take over.

FROM THE BENEFICE MINISTRY TEAM

A few days ago, I heard a sound

which always lifts me, the sound of geese flying over my house. At this point I am reminded that the season is changing and Spring is on the way. There is nothing more beautiful than to look into the sky and see the geese flying in a V formation, especially when there is a large group.

This is not the only sign of Spring though. The snowdrops have been flourishing for a while, daffodils are opening, the primroses are filling the churchyard grounds like a carpet and the buds look ready to burst open on trees. As I drive down the country lanes I know that very soon the bare branches of the hedgerows will explode with green.

The emotions felt in Spring are joy, hope and expectation. As one looks forward to the longer days and the promise of Summer ahead, this prompts a response in us. For some it is the joy in the wonderful creation that surrounds us, the reassurance of the patterns of the seasons, and for others the reminder of new life given by God in creation.

It is good to take time out to look at our wonderful world, to step aside for a short time from our worries and the fears of what is happening in our world, though they are very real, and focus on God.

It is very natural that, as we look at all that surrounds us, we should spend time thanking God for all the joy, hope and expectation that we experience, not just in nature but in life too. Mark Stibbe in his book *Drawing near to God* suggests that our daily prayer should begin at the 'gates of thanksgiving' as we thank God for all the blessings in our life.

MAUNDY THURSDAY SERVICE OF HOLY COMMUNION WITH TENEBRAE

The name Maundy Thursday comes from the word mandatum, 'commandment'. In John 13.34 we read that Jesus said to his disciples at the Last Supper:

'I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another.'

It contains a rich complex of themes: humble Christian service expressed through Christ's washing of his disciples' feet, the institution of the Eucharist, the perfection of Christ's loving obedience through the agony of Gethsemane.

On Maundy Thursday we will be meeting together in All Saints' Odiham at 7.30pm for a quiet and reflective service as we take time to prepare ourselves and to walk with Christ towards the horror of the cross and the joy of Easter Day. Our service will fall into two parts.

The first part will be a communion service during which we will recall the institution of the Lord's Supper, and enact Christ's command to 'do this to remember me'.

The second part will be a Tenebrae, which is a service of shadows in which darkness symbolically encroaches as we step closer to Christ's death on Good Friday. The service is structured around nine short readings and after each reading a candle is extinguished, until the church is in darkness, and we leave quietly as we prepare for Good Friday.

This season of Lent is a time for reflection, and perhaps one thing we may pay attention to is spending time thanking God for all he gives us before we rush into all the requests that are on our minds as we pray. We live in a world where little attention is given to thanks, and yet feedback is sought everywhere. This is often interpreted as an opportunity for criticism – things should be quicker, cheaper, easier – and rarely as a chance to thank those who have provided a service or goods.

As we stand at the gates of thanksgiving each day, our feedback

to God should be one of thanks for the new life we observe in Spring, the spiritual, emotional and material blessings we experience and for the love that he pours on us each day.

Now thank we all our God with heart and hands and voices,

who wondrous things has done, in whom his world rejoices;

who from our mothers' arms has blessed us on our way

with countless gifts of love, and still is ours today.

Hi everyone,

I'm hoping that, by the time you read this, it will be warm and sunny and you will have had plenty of time to play outside in the garden!

This month we are going to think a bit about gardens and even build one together! I wonder if you've ever made an Easter Garden? Basically they are a model, which can tell the Easter story. They're loads of fun to make and can help us remember what happened on Easter weekend.

Firstly, let's remind ourselves of the story! Scan the QR code, or follow this link:

Now, let's grab a few bits and build a garden. Remember these are just ideas. Now you know the story, you can use your creativity to make the garden individual to you!

You may need:

 A shallow tray or box. Any size is fine, but I find A4 paper size or a bit bigger is perfect. You could even make it directly in a corner of your garden at home – just ask permission first!

- Some soil or sand. It's always fun just to get outside and have a dig, but if that isn't possible, compost from the garden centre or even sand works fine.
- A small, circular jar or plantpot.
- Stones (including one large enough to cover the opening of the jar).
- Some sticks and string.
- Grass, moss, small plants (ask permission! I don't want you to pull up Granny's favourite roses!!).

Let's get started!

Firstly, let's add the soil to the tray. It would be great if the soil could cover the whole tray. Place the pot/jar on its side in one corner and then use some more soil to cover it to make a bit of a hill. This is the empty tomb. Lash together two of the twigs to make a cross to place behind the tomb. You could make three, if you wanted, to also represent the two criminals who were crucified on either side of him. Use the moss/grass and plants to cover the soil and make a garden. If you do it soon enough, you could try planting grass or cress



seeds on the soil, so it will grow in time for Easter. You could make a path through the garden leading to the tomb if you wanted! Place the large stone to the side of the opening of the tomb, to represent the stone that was rolled away. You could even place a folded white tissue to represent the grave clothes, if you wanted, or a lego figure to represent the angel who spoke to the ladies, who found the empty tomb. Use your imagination!

As you build the garden, why don't you try to remember the story, tell it to your grown up, maybe even think about how the characters were feeling at the time. We'd love to see how it goes. Send us a pic on email at youth@moretolife.church.




North Hampshire Downs MU

THE CHARMING CHAFFINCH

The chaffinch is one of the UK's most common birds, with an estimated population of over six million breeding pairs in summer.

Throughout winter, chaffinches gather in large flocks, often made up of birds that have migrated from continental Europe, arriving from late October onwards. Those seen alone or in small groups within suburban gardens are more likely to be year-round residents.

As early spring approaches, these winter gatherings break apart as males establish territories and search for a mate. Males put on a lively courtship display, singing to attract a female while performing fluttering flights and spreading their tails to show off their vibrant plumage. Once paired, they remain monogamous for the season, the female will build a well-hidden nest using moss, grass, and spider silk.

The males are especially striking, with pinkish underparts, bluegrey caps, and rich chestnut backs. Females are more subtly coloured in shades of brown, giving them excellent camouflage.

Male chaffinches learn their songs rather than being born with them, and different regions have distinct 'dialects.' Their song, a rapid, descending 'rain of notes', becomes more prominent as spring approaches.

Chaffinches can be seen in woodland and hedgerows, and prefer a mix of dense trees and open areas, perfect for searching for seeds. They often forage beneath trees, using their strong beaks to crack open fallen seeds.

While chaffinches are primarily seedeaters in winter, they shift their diet in spring and summer, feeding on insects to nourish their young.

If you'd like to encourage chaffinches into your garden, sunflower seeds and mixed seed blends are ideal, especially in winter when natural food sources are scarce. Although they will happily visit bird tables, they do not feed openly on feeders, preferring to hop about on the ground and under hedges instead.

Our new Events group had a Hit with their Music Ouiz focused on popular


music from the 60s, 70s, and 80s. It was a sellout, as members remembered Thursday TOTP and the evening was rated... 'Oi'll give it foive!'
