

The Environment and Infrastructure Committee meeting of Thursday 04 September was BDBC's first public debate on the new Spatial Strategy. Portfolio holder Cllr Andy Konieczko introduced the paper: 'It is fair to say this is a meeting none of us wanted to hold about a draft Spatial Strategy none of us wanted to produce.'

The new Spatial Strategy is a direct response to Government's imposed housing numbers – for Basingstoke & Deane an increase from 830 new homes per annum to 1,150.

Cllr Kate Tuck asked if there is confidence that housing sites can be delivered from a utility services perspective? Has BDBC received confirmation from these authorities that the overall level of development in the borough can be supported? And what measures are proposed if some sites become technically or financially unviable and Government housing numbers cannot be met? Planning Policy Manager responded that many of these issues are caught up by the Infrastructure Development Plan; a lot more information will be published with Reg 18 consultation. But these conversations are ongoing and will continue as the Plan

develops. Water issues will be

captured in the Water Cycle Study

(WCS); work undertaken so far has identified there are issues in terms of supply and treatment works.

Cllr Konieczko confirmed that this new WCS was commissioned to evidence what providers need to do to sustain the level of housing growth BDBC is required to provide. The first draft should be ready in time for Reg 18. Ultimately if this shows a water infrastructure deficit, then a case to go back to Government to say 'we can't deliver these housing numbers and here is the clear evidence why'. All have concerns about infrastructure delivery, but have to come up with very robust evidence to make a case. BDBC's Head of Planning provided a recap and then outlined the Draft Local Plan process going forward...

'Council undertook a full draft (Reg 18) planning consultation in early 2024, before the Dec 2024 NPPF and higher housing figures. National policy requires we meet the new figures in full, which means it's been necessary to carry out an

additional call for sites and consider how we might meet that target.

'That has led us to propose a new Reg 18 consultation focussed on the new Spatial Strategy – which sets out what type of development will take place and where – and the details of proposed sites to be allocated for new homes and employment space.

'Cabinet will consider recommendations from Committee this evening and providing they agree to the 'focussed' Reg 18 consultation, this will be published later this year supported by evidence documents published alongside it.

[NOTE] 'Comments received from the previous (2024) Reg 18 consultation on all other sections of the Plan and Planning Policy remain under consideration. Following the new focussed Reg 18, all comments will be brought together to inform changes to be made for the Reg 19 Draft Plan due to be published for consultation mid 2026. Reg 19 only considers whether the Draft Plan is sound and legally compliant.'

Cllr Konieczko emphasised that if miss December 2026 deadline for submission to Inspector, a new planning system is expected to give local authorities even less of a say over the local plan making process.

PARISH PLANNING APPLICATIONS

25/02178/LDEU (Validated 08 Sept). The Gamekeepers. Certificate of lawful development for the existing use of the Gamekeepers as a restaurant.

25/01920/HSE (Pending 20 August) Eastrop Farm House, Heather Row Lane. Installation of a swimming pool and shed to house pumping and filtration.

25/01148/FUL (Pending 09 June) Nunnery House, Tunworth Road. New vehicular access onto Tunworth Road, including driveway construction and associated landscaping works for approved new-build.

24/02682/FUL (Pending 28 March) Hungry Lodge, Down Lane. Change of agricultural land to residential use and erection of greenhouse (part retrospective).

25/00304/HSE (Pending 26 February) 6 St Stephens Close. Erection of part first floor, two storey side and rear extension and single storey rear extensions.

CERTIFICATE OF LAWFUL DEVELOPMENT AND PLANNING USE CLASS

A Certificate of Lawful Development, for existing use as a restaurant, if

granted for the Gamekeepers, would confirm – as it says – that the Gamekeepers is currently a restaurant and not a pub. This decision will be made by BDBC, based on the evidence available on the balance of probability. They will look at evidence they hold, evidence in the public domain, and evidence submitted in response to the application.

Planning use class Government made significant changes to the Use Classes Order in September 2020 on the back of its summer 2020 *Planning for the Future* White Paper. The legislation is the Town and Country Planning (Use Classes) (Amendment) (England) Regulations 2020.

A public house is in a Sui generis class, a use class of its own, which allows for 'expanded food provision'. A Sui generis class cannot be changed to another use class without a planning application.

The new planning Use Class E

(in England) incorporates a range of previous use classes:

- Class A1 (Shops): Retail stores.
- Class A2 (Financial and Professional Services): Banks, building societies, estate agents etc.
- Class A3 (Restaurants and Cafés): eateries and food service businesses.
- Class B1 (Business): Offices.
- Parts of Class D1 (Non-residential Institutions): Including health centres, clinics, crèches, nurseries.
- Parts of Class D2 (Assembly and Leisure): Specifically indoor sports and recreation uses, like gyms.

A business premises in England which now finds itself within Class E can change use via permitted development – across any of the old classes noted above – without need for planning permission. (Unless permitted development rights had previously been removed.)

If it is accepted that the current use is as a restaurant – ie the current use is confirmed as Class E – then Class E permitted development rights will already lawfully exist and cannot be removed retrospectively.

Mike Richardson 'It is with great sadness I announce the death of my husband Michael (Mike) Richardson on Sunday August 31st, aged 84. Mike was born on July 22nd 1941 at Dipley, Hartley Wintney. Mike was a motor fitter all of his working life and on retirement still liked to tinker with cars and enjoying his garden. He loved growing produce for the family especially his runner beans every year

'I met Mike in 1964 at our local pub, The Gardeners Arms at West Green where I grew up, and only less than a quarter of a mile from Mike's home. We hit it off and were married in 1967 at John's Church in Hartley Wintney; after honeymooning in Swanage we moved into Whisperwood. Mike was a very private man and loved spending time at home with his family. I could never persuade him to join me in local activities, it just wasn't him, although holidays were fine.

'On the 30th of September we would have celebrated our 58th wedding anniversary; 58 years together is quite a stretch. We enjoyed a happy marriage and like everyone we had our ups and downs but importantly we raised two beautiful children together in that time who have been my saviours in the last two years helping me nurse and look after Mike. He was diagnosed with Parkinsons and Dementia in early 2023, later being bed ridden. But for a couple of short stays in hospital, the children and I – with grateful help from our nurses and frailty team – were able to happily fulfil his wishes and keep him at home were he wanted to stay... we all miss him so much.' NEWS FROM REV DEBZ

Dear friends,

In the Church of England, the usual 'career path' is for someone to first be ordained as a Deacon (and become 'Reverend') and then, after a year, be ordained as a Priest.

For me, the journey began a little differently. When I first applied, I thought my calling would be to chaplaincy or community ministry. I applied to be a Distinctive Deacon – a permanent Deacon whose ministry focuses more on serving in the community than leading a parish church.

But God had other plans! I was called to the North Hampshire Downs Benefice, where I have been given the joy and privilege of caring for the two wonderful churches of St Nicholas' Newnham and St Swithun's Nately Scures.

In practice, I have found myself doing much of the work of a parish priest. The main difference is, as a Deacon, I cannot preside at Holy Communion or officiate at weddings – though I can take funerals and baptisms. This has helped me sense that God may be calling me to priestly ministry.

With the encouragement of our Rector, Revd Chris Dudgeon, and the support of many others, I entered a period of discernment. After months of reflection and paperwork, the Diocese has now affirmed that call. I am delighted to share that I will be ordained Priest this December.

Becoming a Priest is not a promotion; it's different, but equally valuable. On the ground, not much will change for our congregations, but I will be able to preside at Holy Communion and officiate at weddings, alongside the ministry I already love.

FROM THE BENEFICE MINISTRY TEAM

As I sit in my happy place (in my garden, with a

morning cup of coffee, squeezing out every drop of summer that I can), I reflect on the weekend just gone, and wanted to share a few snapshots, which have got me thinking. Your job is to work out what they have in common!

First, let me introduce (a small corner of...) my garden, where I'm sitting right now. It's a very special corner. It's filled with vegetables and flowers, from seeds lovingly brought from Ukraine, reared into seedlings and then given to me by friends I've met over the last three years.

My back ached the morning after I prepared the ground, from rotavating, weeding and planting, but it was a good ache! And now, every morning, I can come and watch the tomatoes ripen, the courgettes swell and the brightly coloured flowers bloom.

Second snapshot is from Saturday evening at the very successful Ukrainian youth concert. There were so many moments that I could focus

on from that evening, but one that sticks out for me was when Mariia and Sofiia, two sisters from Pokrovsk in Ukraine, stood hand-in-hand on the stage and sang 'The Climb'. If you don't know it, it's a song by Miley Cyrus about perseverance and the courage to keep moving forward, step by step, even when the path is steep.

'The struggles I'm facing
The chances I'm taking
Sometimes might knock me down, but
No, I'm not breaking
I gotta be strong
Just keep pushing on!'

Their home, school, life in Ukraine have all been destroyed. And yet, there they are, standing hand in hand, despite being really nervous, singing their hearts out. Determined to make a difference.

And the final snapshot, from our Sunday Funday, was when I went and sat down next to a young family who were enjoying a picnic. Before I was even fully seated, the young lad asked me, 'Why do bad things happen to good people?' I'm not easily phased, but this certainly wasn't the conversation I was expecting to have with an eight-year-old that day. I've no idea what's happened in this young life, to cause him to ask this question. Who he has seen suffer or struggle. But he was determined to work it out, determined to look beyond the negative, determined to make a difference. (And, just in case you're interested, we ended up speaking about Job and how life got so tough for him, but he continued to trust in God and God blessed him. But that's an editorial for another day...)

So, what themes do these three stories have in common?

Well, I think I'll accept two possible answers. Firstly, that the life of a Youth Pastor is never boring and no two days are the same! On that note, if you want to be part of that, working with children and young people across our villages, do please get in touch, we'd love to have you on board!

But secondly, and more importantly for me, is the search for hope. Oh here she goes again, I hear you cry...! After brief research into my previous Kidzones and other's editorials, I realise it's something that has come up a few times recently. But, there's definitely a reason for that! Because, in this crazy world, often hope is all we have to hold on to.

Now, before I go any further, let me make something totally clear: for me, hope is very different from optimism. Optimism basically boils down to believing that 'everything will turn out alright'. I'd love to say I was always an optimist. But right now, sometimes I can't manage that. But, as Desmund Tutu said, 'I am always hopeful. In fact, I'm a prisoner of hope'. Being a 'prisoner of hope' means you cannot escape hope; you are anchored to it, refusing to be discouraged despite difficult situations. Hope is that conviction that, whatever comes your way, you can do something to make things better. Or as I often say to my young people, you may not be able to change the world, but you can change your little corner of it! Hope involves a personal agency and commitment, a sense of power and motivation. Hope is an active choice. We can choose to be hopeful, just as much as we can choose to give up hope...

So, the Ukrainians who tended their seedlings, the sisters who sang with clasped hands, the boy who asked the difficult question, what were they were all doing? They were actively reaching out for hope. Refusing to give up hope, but rather doing everything in their power to make a difference, shine a light, bring hope...

I wonder what you hope for? What causes your heart to ache? What you would give everything to see change? And what are you doing to bring about that hope?

So, let us return to my garden. For me, that corner of my garden is like a metaphor for hope. These fragile, vulnerable seedlings, which had travelled all across Europe, are in my care. I can't promise they'll all succeed and flourish (mainly because of our pesky slugs!!), but I am hopeful they will. So, every evening I'll go out and weed and water. Every morning I'll check in on them with my coffee. If they need a little tlc, I'll give it. The sun will shine. The rain will fall. The slugs will munch. But I'll still be there with my coffee every morning, hopeful for a bountiful harvest.
